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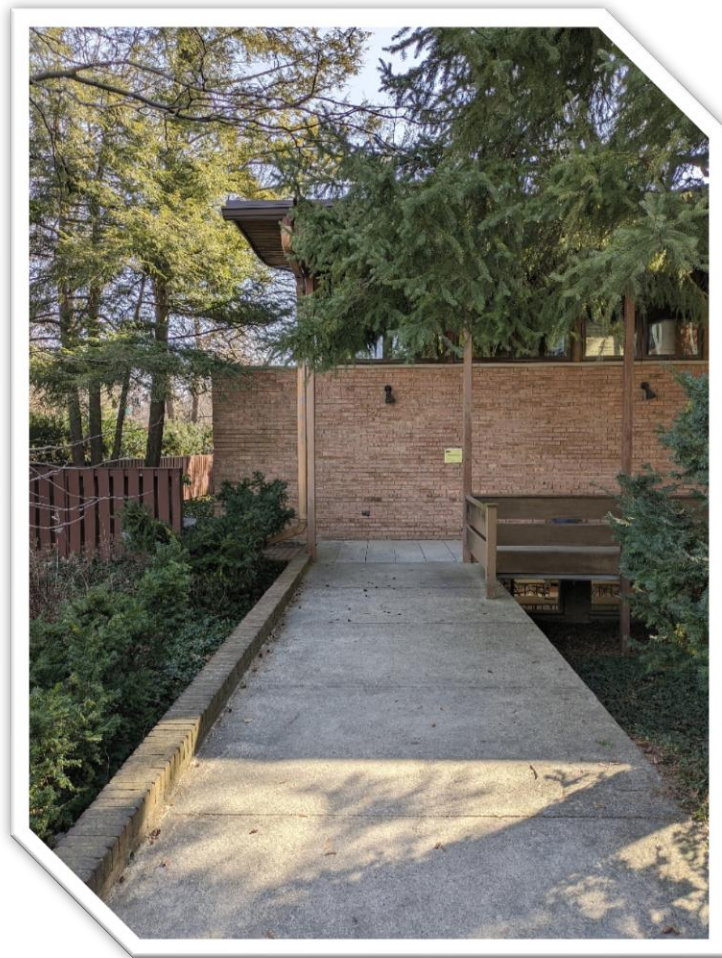

Join the Friends Committee on National Legislation (FCNL) Advocacy Team when we meet every month on the fourth Wednesday from 9:30 a.m.–noon. Because we have both Ann Arbor and Chelsea members, we toggle between the two locations for meetings. Our purpose is to build relationships with our members of US Congress, and to support bills promoting matters of peace and justice. Sometimes we meet with the staff of our Senators and Representative; more often we make phone calls, or write letters to the members or to

newspaper editors. We are amply supported by the large, expert staff in the Washington DC office of FCNL and by other Advocacy Teams in Michigan.

Our elected officials need constituents who will encourage, teach, appreciate, and hold them accountable to work for the common good. Governed by members of the Religious Society of Friends, FCNL acts in faith to create a world free from war, a society with equity and justice for all, a community where every person's potential may be fulfilled and an earth restored. One current issue is urging congressional members to oppose the transfer of more weapons of war and military support to Israel.

# Report to Ann Arbor Friends on the Annual Meeting of Lake Erie Yearly Meeting held at Ashland University, Ashland, Ohio on June 18-21, 2026.

**One Annual Meeting:** One real advantage of holding annual Sessions in Ashland is that the adult and children's meetings were in rooms quite close to each other, so there was a more frequent mixing of the two groups of Friends, in both sessions and the dining hall. It felt much more like one group. However, the Saturday evening entertainment was mostly a Quaker Quiz which the children did not attend because it didn't cater to their interests. Whatever happened to the good old talent show which all could enjoy and allowed us to appreciate the talents, fun and music from a variety of Friends?

**Bible study and workshops:** Doug Gwyn of Richmond, IN, Quaker author, and teacher at Pendle Hill, led the two Bible study sessions again this year. Doug had us consider the parallels between the life and teachings of St Paul and George Fox. Stimulating indeed!

There were 11 workshops this year. I attended three of them, one of which I led on balancing movement, alternatives to sitting, designed to prevent falls and to experience moving meditation. Another workshop was presented by Dennis Gregg (Ann Arbor). He shared a paper on the various types of conflict that happen in Friends Meetings. It led to a spirited discussion, in which some conflict happened within the group, making for an immediate unplanned example.

**Business Meetings** were well clerked by Jack Smith (Red Cedar MM) and minuted by Peggy Daub (Ann Arbor MM). Real attention was given to making sure that all Friends present could hear each spoken contribution through both a hand-carried microphone and text printout on the large screen. Of course, since all meetings for business were on zoom, every contribution needed to be via microphone so distant Friends could hear.

**The Final Meeting for Worship** on Sunday morning was not on zoom, so the clerk asked Friends to either use the microphone or to speak loud enough to be understood. None asked for the microphone and almost all were understood. It was a deeply spirit-ful meeting for worship, which lasted for nearly five minutes after the shaking of hands. Friends continued to sit and stand in deep worshipful silence, happy to be together.

**"Joyful Resistance as a Practice of Hope\*,"** and the plenary talk given by Ann Arbor Meeting member, Joe Volk, now living in Kendal at Longwood, gave powerful witness to how Friendly Persuasion works. Joe told of having a leading to be inducted into the army rather than allowing himself to be excused as a conscientious objector. In the army, he could follow the principles of Gandhi and refuse to fight. The resulting suffering could then be put to a worthy purpose. He also told of being part of a group in 12 canoes which blocked the departure of an aircraft carrier from its port in Virginia. It led to friendly behavior from navy seals who enjoyed themselves tipping over the canoes. In his humorous, friendly way, Joe gave other examples of turning enemies into friends: in a pray-in by religious leaders at the White House, and another time, showing the FCNL green building to an antagonistic conservative senator who ended up doing the same to the property he controlled.

As you can imagine, Joe's workshop was well attended, with Friends sharing about times they have dealt with unfriendly adversaries. I hope his talk may be made into a pamphlet for all to read.

Of course, this is only one Friend's experience of a multifaceted four days with Friends from a wide geographic area from Holland, MI to Pittsburgh PA. For other impressions, speak to other folks in the band

of a dozen or so Friends from our meeting who were there, or read about the meeting in the YM Annual Records when they become available.

**The American Friends Service Committee** asks you to write your Representative and ask them to cosponsor H.R.3565, the [Block the Bombs Act](#). By introducing this bill, Members of Congress are proactively trying to block the Trump administration from delivering major US weapons to Israel. If enacted into law, this bill would block the following weapons to Israel: BLU-109 bunker busting bombs, MK80 series bombs, GBU-39 small diameter bomb variants, Joint Direct Attack Munitions (JDAMs), SPICE gliding bomb assemblies, 120mm tank ammunition, and 155mm artillery ammunition, including white phosphorus munitions.

### Proposed Change in LEYM Database

At last year's Annual Meeting, Publications & Archives Committee was asked whether we need to maintain records for all members of constituent meetings in the LEYM database and how, if at all, their contact information should be accessible. P&A will bring to Annual Meeting a proposal that was previously considered and supported by Executive Committee, and was presented at Representative Meeting:

Annually, the database manager will ask monthly meetings for their directories in digital format and, unless otherwise requested, forward any that are received to the Friends Historical Collection at Swarthmore College and to Friends General Conference but not compile this data into a Yearly Meeting directory or add it to the database [as has been our practice]. Monthly Meetings can make their own decisions about what information they send to the database manager or can ask that their directory information not be forwarded elsewhere. In keeping with LEYM's privacy policy, Meetings will be asked either to identify or redact names and email addresses for people under 18, so these will not be forwarded to Swarthmore or FGC.

Note: The database manager will continue to collect and include in the database contact information for 1) officers, committee members, and other Friends with individual responsibilities in LEYM (e.g., the Bulletin editor); 2) those Friends who attend Annual Meeting; and 3) clerks and committee clerks of Monthly Meetings as well as contact people in worship groups.

Last year, the program raised over \$5000, including a donation from our meeting, to distribute food through **Peace House** (one of our Reparative Justice recipients) and **Brown Chapel AME**.
